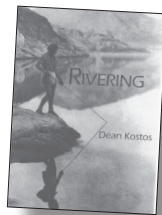

In this new book of poetry, T&W Teaching Artist Dean Kostos “is an impassioned observer who sees beneath the surface to sub-

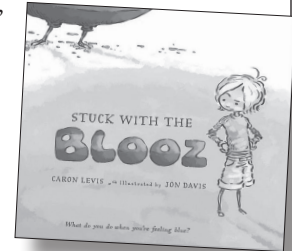

terranean rivers.... Yet his richly rendered poems also offer burnished and evocative depictions of our world as encapsulated in art,” says the poet Rachel Hadas.

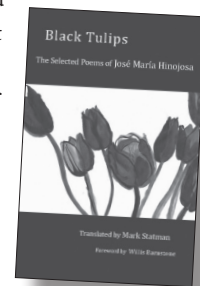
Stuck with the Blooz
