And Binoculars*, and *Ka-trina Who?!* have been performed at Yale University, The Lillian Theater in Los Angeles, The Nuyorican Poets Café and The Chelsea Playhouse in New York City, and at the National Black Arts Festival in Atlanta. She is a freelance teaching artist who teaches creative writing and drama in all the boroughs of New York City with Teachers & Writers Collaborative and Creative Theatrics.

**Edward Hirsch** is a poet and an interpreter of modern poetry. He is the author of six books of poems: *For the Sleepwalkers* (1981); *Wild Gratitude* (1986), which won the National Book Critics Circle Award; *The Night Parade* (1989); *Earthly Measures* (1994); *On Love* (1998); and *Lay Back the Darkness* (2003). Hirsch has also written four prose books, including the 1999 best seller *How to Read a Poem and Fall in Love with Poetry* and *Poet's Choice* (2006). He has received the Prix de Rome, a Guggenheim Fellowship, the American Academy of Arts and Letters Award for Literature, and a MacArthur Fellowship. He taught for 18 years at the University of Houston and is now the fourth president of the John Simon Guggenheim Memorial Foundation.

**Chris Malcomb** has taught English at the Prison University Project at San Quentin, sixth grade at Prospect Sierra School in El Cerrito, CA, and writing & meditation workshops at the Bay Area Teacher Training Institute. His essays have appeared in the *San Francisco Chronicle Magazine, The East Bay Monthly* and *The Sun*. He is a frequent contributor to KQED radio's *Perspectives* series and is currently working on his first book, a collection of essays exploring how classrooms—both formal and informal—provide opportunities for spiritual growth. He lives in Berkeley, California.

**Sarah Porter**'s stories and poems have appeared in *Open City, Sonaweb*, and *The New Review of Literature*. She teaches creative writing in the New York public schools. Currently enrolled in City College's M.F.A. writing program and working on a novel, *Umber*, she expects to complete both next year. She also VJ's under the name The Housewives' Guide to Anatomy and with the media collectives Fort Da and Image Node. She lives in Brooklyn with her husband, the multimedia artist Todd Polenberg, and two cats.
